3. Display sufficient familiarity with major features of current politics and society in more than one European country and the European Union to understand typical media reports.
4. Exhibit a general understanding of basic physical and human patterns found in Europe, and of Europe's situation in the wider world.
5. Display familiarity with the cultural production (literature, music, art) of one or more of the national patrimonies of Europe.
